WARDEN REPORT LESSON: BLITZ SCHOOL LESSON PLAN: SUPPLEMENTARY LESSON NOTES:

Notes on objectives:

This lesson is based around the children's writing of a fictional air raid incident report, resulting in them reciting it to a partner (or the teacher) as if they were delivering a genuine report from the time. As such, it covers several English writing and speaking & listening objectives, as well as the obvious History WW2 topic objectives.

How were incidents really reported in WW2?

The warden would normally be the first on the scene and would contact the control room either by telephone or messenger using the form to organise the information. He/She would read the information from the form to a dedicated controller (much like the current 999 service) who would assign different services such as fire, ambulance etc. to the incident.

A key part of this lesson is emphasising the succinct and formal nature of the report – in other words they wouldn't have time for pleasantries!

Suggested lesson sequence:

There are several parts to the lesson (or lessons) as follows, depending on how far you want to extend it:

- 1. Learning about real life incidents using the 'York incident report'
- 2. Learning how incidents were reported using the form
- 3. The pupils working together in pairs to devise an incident/complete the form
- 4. The verbal reporting of the incident to a 'controller' as if in an actual WW2 situation (either to another pupil, pair of pupils, or the teacher whole class)
- 5. Evaluation would it have worked? I.e. would it have given the controller enough information to be able to deal with the incident effectively?
- 6. Extension work (see below)

Suggestions for extension:

As well as the original lesson idea, these are just a couple of suggestions to take it forward (though I have no doubt you can come up with more ⁽²⁾)

English:

- A diary of the incident from different perspectives e.g. rescuer, a person being rescued, the controller
- A newspaper article about the incident
- A poem (if you choose this option, see our additional "Air Raid Warden Poem" lesson here: <u>http://www.blitzschool.co.uk/#/new-poetry-lesson/4555710770</u>
- A playscript and performance of the incident



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WARDEN REPORT LESSON: ACTUAL LESSON PLAN (pg. 3):

PUPIL SPEAK OBJECTIVES:

To learn how air raid incidents were reported in the WW2 Blitz To learn how to write and deliver an incident report to suit the purpose

INTRO: blitz incident familiarisation

OPTIONAL PART 1 (10-15 min)

- Show pupils the BLITZ PHOTOPACK (available from the website), either whole class or with copies on tables.
- Allow some discussion time with the following key questions:
 - 1. What is happening in the photos?
 - 2. What difficulties would the rescuers face?
 - 3. How would it have felt to have been both the rescuer and the trapped person?
 - 4. + any other questions the pupils can devise themselves

PART 2 (10 min): reading an account of an actual incident

- Show pupils the real report from the York air raid, discussing the sequence of events and the list of casualties
- Discuss the amount of information that the warden would have had to report for the incident and relate this to the report form they will be using

PUPIL TASK (or as guided writing): (20-25 min)

Writing your own report:

- Show pupils the sample report, listing a fictional incident
- Discuss the simplicity of the information and model the speaking and listening element with a volunteer controller pretending to write down the information as you read it from the form (remembering to keep it very formal and succinct)
- Pupils then to attempt to write their own reports in pairs

PLENARY:

- Role play the reading of the reports to a fictional controller, either whole class (i.e. with the teacher as controller) or in swapped pairs
- How does it match to the objective? In other words, would it have been an effective report, providing enough information for the incident to be dealt with?

DIFFERENTIATION OPTIONS:

- High/lower ability pairings
- Choose a writing, speaking or listening role to suit pupil needs

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CITY of YORK CIVIL DEFENCE

Air Raid Damage, 2nd Aug. 1942 Report on Air Raid

I have to report that on Sunday, 2nd Aug. a lone raider, flying low, dropped 4 bombs on the city at 16.36 hours. The Observer Alarm was received at 16.32 hours and the siren sounded at 16.40 hours. Two bombs exploded in the vicinity of 26 Skeldergate and Albert St. Walmgate respectively and approximately 400 properties were damaged in varying degree. Unexploded bombs fell at Buckingham Works, Buckingham St. and at the foot of the steps to Clifford Tower. These have been dealt with by the Bomb Disposal Squads. The services required were quickly in action and casualties promptly attended to.
